PLEASE remember to remove structures before storms!










City of Dixon Ponds help to detain urban drainage until the RCD systems have room in Laterals 1, 2 & 3



The Complete DRAFT of the Solano GSP is available for review at *solanogsp.com* The five groundwater sustainability agencies (GSAs) that make up the Solano Collaborative will be considering approval of the plan at their December meetings.

The 31 page Executive Summary provides a good overview of the more than 6,500 page GSP. Below are some highlights.

The Plan Area covers 354,600 acres – 79% in Solano County, 20% in Sacramento County and 1% in Yolo County. The Land Use by area is 58% Ag., 32% Riparian/Native, 9% Urban.

The Sustainable Yield for the Subbasin is estimated to be 190,000 acre feet per year for the combined primary aquifers, which is equal to the projected volume of groundwater extracted annually in the Subbasin with future land use and 2070 climate change conditions.

Potential funding and financing sources in the plan include grants, bonds, private borrowing, low interest loans, fees and/or taxes. Recent discussions have included the potential to charge per acre fees. A rate study is being initiated for the potential fees to be collected through property tax assessments in 2023.



Along with the increased ditch fees, grant funding and shared service agreements with other agencies have helped the District achieve sufficient reserves. The Board's objective continues to be to use the ditch maintenance fees paid by you to maintain and improve the drainage system.

Fiscal Year 2021-22

The '21 -'22 Budget anticipates a negative net position of \$34,580, primarily due to increased ditch capital expenditures and increased costs for ditch maintenance activities. Overall, the District's financial position is sound. The Board continues to monitor revenues and expenses to ensure the overall plans and objectives set forward in the 2016 Ditch Maintenance Fee Rate Study are achieved. The Board expects that during the next five (5) year planning period, expenditures will at times exceed revenues. However, the Board has dedicated reserves sufficient to cover the anticipated fluctuations.
