Focuses From 2012 Review of Services

- Regional Drainage Working with RD 2068, Solano County Water Agency, City of Dixon, & Maine Prairie Water District, we formed the Dixon Regional Watershed Joint Powers Authority to implement the Dixon Regional Watershed Management Plan (2000). See insert for more detail.
- Continue to operate and maintain the 70mile drainage system constructed by DRCD in 1950s—60's in the most cost effective manner possible.
- Conservation Education Together with Solano RCD, we administer the Irrigated Lands Program, conduct regular water quality monitoring, and provide management practice education to help members comply with State regulations.
- Wildlife Habitat We manage three agricultural subleases on the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area that explore & showcase agricultural practices that benefit wildlife habitat for the public.
- State & National Participation We continue to remain active.

~ History of the Dixon RCD ~

This year marked the 25th Anniversary of the Dixon Resource Conservation District. In January of 1952, a group of eight farmers, including: Walter Anderson, Vernon Schmeiser, Bud Rose, J. C. Wiggens, William Tutt, Godfrey Priddy, Arnold Collier, and Bud Anderson got together to see if, through mutual help and cooperation, something could be done to solve local flood control problems in the Dixon area. The group decided to form a Soil Conservation District on February 27, 1952. The petition was started June 19th and completed July 24, 1952. The district was officially organized by the County Board of Supervisors on September 2, 1952. Official records show that members of the first Board of Directors included:

Their principle interest was the construction and maintenance of one or more large drainage ditches to handle winter runoff. The District, in 1952, totaled 16,128 acres; however, the popularity and success of the District program rapidly spread and the District boundaries grew until the present acreage, 114,968 acres, was achieved.

With the completion of the major drainage projects behind them, the District must now look to the future and set priorities and goals on a number of important issues. These include: providing strong representation of farming interests in directing the bulk of future growth to existing non-prime farmland areas within the county, representation of farming interests in the solution of the City of Dixon drainage problem and the active participation in the 208

2012 DIXON RCD COOPERATOR OF THE YEAR

The 2012 Cooperator(s) of the Year are Cliff, Luke & Gabe DeTar of DeTar Livestock. In addition to projects with Solano Resource Conservation District, they have worked with USDA NRCS to install several conservation practices on their properties over the last few years including:

* Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP) 2010: Replaced 3200 ft of broken concrete pipeline and open ditch with PVC pipeline and alfalfa risers, reducing irrigation water loss and significantly increasing irrigation efficiency.

* EQIP 2011: Replaced 3900 ft of open ditch irrigation with PVC pipeline and alfalfa risers resulting in reduced irrigation water loss and increased irrigation efficiency.

For both projects, closing the open irrigation ditch and getting the cattle out of the ditch improved the quality of tail water runoff from the fields and into the drainage system. It also prevented the cattle drinking from the ditch water and improved animal health.

* EQIP Cooperative Conservation Partnership Initiative (CCPI) : 185 acres are included in a 3 year contract to spray artichoke thistle in the Montezuma Hills. 2 years of the contract have been completed with good results. Mapping of infested areas are done and follow-up monitoring is also completed. Artichoke thistle is rapidly spreading in range areas of southern and southwest Solano County reducing rangeland productivity.

Cliff and his partner Martin Ronayne of D&R Livestock are also working with NRCS on a project to develop alternative watering facilities for their livestock. They are installing 10,000 feet of pipeline & 10 water troughs to facilitate rotational grazing through 10 pastures. The practice provides a clean water source to prevent livestock drinking from tailwater ditches to improve water quality.
